

PETER AND LINDA VON DREELE RESTORE VOLUNTEERS

At a juncture in my 1980 Illinois life, I [Linda] enrolled in the Urban Planning and Policy at the University of Illinois Chicago. My goal was to work in large Chicago neighborhoods. My first encounter was on the West Side of Chicago at the Bethel New Life nonprofit that had gone to Americus, GA, to talk with Millard Fuller about bringing Habitat for Humanity to Chicago. The result was building the first Habitat home on the West Side. Bethel leading, those present were Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter and company, along with locals like my husband and me who had our picture taken with President Carter (pictured below). I would go on to serve the original Chicago Habitat Board for six years.



From that build, Chicago Habitat restored a beautiful old two-flat home on a local street that could be reestablished for urban poverty need. Two local congregations, Grace Episcopal Church and Dutch Reformed Church, worked every Saturday for nine months along with the two upcoming Habitat homeowners. There was a great home celebration on Washington Blvd. sidewalk when it was all finished. Around 1986, there was a semi-annual Habitat for Humanity conference in Chicago that was held at Grace Church. The three-day session had plenty of space in the church, including the large nave transept where Jimmy Carter and others spoke from the pulpit. The congregation produced ample meals with those present and with locals who were receiving Habitat's work in the area for the first time.

In 2018 we moved to Colorado to be close to our family. One of our St. Paul's Episcopal members, Gray Currier, introduced us to the work of Habitat in this area. Knowing that our aging would not allow us to do the kinds of work we used to do, we found Fort Collins ReStore. Our weekly hours give us gratification, for we help organize what is in the store areas, enjoy working with the great staff, and welcoming and chatting with the shoppers.

Habitat for Humanity has given us the opportunity to share for those in need.

At first, I was doing a lot of painting and slowly gaining confidence in myself. 
BOOKS FOR HUMANITY

This year has been one for the books at Fort Collins Habitat! We closed on nine homes in 2024, including a historic day in December where four families closed on their new homes on the same day. These nine new homes in our community brought us to a grand total of 107 total home closings for our organization.

But the momentum doesn't stop there. Looking ahead, we will touch over twenty homes this fiscal year across multiple locations, setting the stage for even more families to achieve homeownership. This year also marks the start of construction on the final units of our Harmony Cottages project, a major achievement years in the making. As we take on these ambitious projects, we lean more than ever on the hands and hearts of our volunteers and the support of our Fort Collins community. Together, we make home possible.
